Shining a Light on Comprehensive Afterschool and Summer Enrichment Programs and Opportunities

For a moment, some students' thoughts may have turned away from the book they're reading or their math homework to get excited about attending an afterschool program.

We know that learning is never truly over, and high-quality afterschool and summer enrichment programs are critical to education. These



programs get kids excited about learning, help them develop essential skills, and help them stay on track for a bright and prosperous future. Studies show that kids in afterschool programs attend school more, get better grades, and are more likely to graduate.

The Attendance Works 2022 Awareness Campaign - Stay Connected, Keep Learning is a nationwide effort to promote the importance of regular attendance and engage partners in supporting solutions to reducing chronic absence. Why does afterschool support the campaign? If young people aren't attending school, then it's a good chance they aren't attending afterschool programs. That's why the Delaware Afterschool Network is Attendance Works' state partner.

Afterschool and summer learning programs help with unfinished learning, prepare young people for careers or college, and focus on social-emotional learning. An excellent afterschool and summer learning program can turn aimless hours into productive learning time. That's a significant benefit, especially for kids who learn and think differently. Out-of-school time programs help young people find their passion, purpose, and voice. They also find that the best programs develop activities to meet the particular needs of the communities they serve.

Afterschool programs are essential for Delaware children and families. However, too many kids are still missing out, and currently, there is no centralized system for collecting and utilizing operational information on extended learning programs. We are leading the way in developing an interactive program map of all the out-of-school time programs in the state. We cannot advocate for and fund what we can't see!

Lastly, these programs spark students' enthusiasm, persistence, and curiosity about what they are learning in school and can also engage students who learn differently. Students who are struggling can review skills and concepts, get a chance to apply them in different settings, and attain a sense of success that will provide increased confidence during the school day. The Engage Every Student Initiative is an opportunity to strengthen structures, pathways, and principles for high-quality afterschool, summer, and out-of-school programming. The initiative provides schools and communities the connections and assistance they need to expand access to afterschool and summer learning programs.

These are only a few ways that we are coming together to demonstrate everything we are doing to forge successful futures for all youth and families.

A call to action!

We want programs to host Lights On Afterschool events and invite parents, legislators, and elected officials. We want afterschool, summer, and out-of-school time providers to complete the interactive program map survey. Lastly, we need everyone to support the Engage Every Student initiative.

As we move forward, let's continue to shine a light on all that afterschool programs do to promote positive outcomes and help young people remain strong, healthy, and resilient.

October 20th is Lights On Afterschool!

Afterschool programs provide opportunities for school-age students to engage in academically enriching activities, take part in physical activities, build friendships, gain confidence, learn how to make responsible decisions, and seek advice and support from caring adults and mentors. Afterschool programs are an instrumental partner for schools and families—providers are connected to their students, complement school-day lessons, and provide essential supports for families.

According to the 2022 America After 3PM report, 16,237 kids in Delaware participate in afterschool. 81% of parents say afterschool helps them keep their jobs and 85% say it helps provide them with a peace of mind. We also know that 62,518 kids would participate in an afterschool program if one were available.

This is why we must continue to SHINE a LIGHT about the impact of comprehensive afterschool and summer enrichment programs!

So, Delaware, let's join more than 8,000 communities and 1 million Americans in celebrating afterschool programs for this year's Lights On Afterschool! This nationwide event, organized by the Afterschool Alliance and in partnership with the 50 State Afterschool Network calls attention to the importance of afterschool programs and the resources required to keep the lights on and the doors open.

This year we celebrate all the programs that kept the doors open and lights on for students and their families. Delaware Afterschool Network Interactive Program Map: Help Us Put Afterschool and Summer Enrichment Programs on the Map!

In Delaware, the gap between the last school bell ringing and when parents arrive home from work has long been a concern of families, law enforcement, and community members due to the potential dangers and risky behaviors that take place after school. But, unfortunately, the hours after school when children are on their own are not just a time of risk. It is also a time of lost opportunities to help students grow and develop the skills and competencies to make positive life decisions that can lead to their future success.

Delaware's afterschool programs offer many opportunities for its youngest citizens, from Kindergarteners to High School Seniors, to enhance their academic performance, explore and prepare for their future careers, and become active participants in their communities.

We have many programs and services to support children and families. Still, the delivery may not be consistent or reach children with the highest needs and their families in every community.

Currently, there is no centralized system for collecting and utilizing operational information on extended learning programs in Delaware, limiting decision-makers ability to understand the entire body of work undertaken by extended learning programs and their impact.

The Delaware Afterschool Network and our partners advocate for high-quality, comprehensive afterschool and summer enrichment programs for all of Delaware's children and families. We are leading the way in developing an interactive program

map of all the out-of-school time programs in the state.

Our goal is to provide a comprehensive overview of afterschool, summer enrichment, and out-of-school time programs and the services they provide. The interactive map will not only help parents connect with their local programs but will also help to identify gaps in programming throughout the state. The more we know about the landscape of out-of-school time programs in the state, the better we can advocate for expanding programs and helping Delaware's families. We cannot advocate for and fund what we cannot see!

Our goal is to have at least fifty afterschool programs on the map by November 31st. The first 25 programs to complete the survey will be entered into a drawing to win a \$50 Visa gift card for program supplies.

A Bold New Initiative – Opportunity to *Engage Every Student*

Engage Every Student is a bold new call to action to provide high-quality out-of-school time learning opportunities for every child who wants to participate. The initiative, launched by U.S. Secretary of Education



Miguel Cardona in July, works to provide schools and communities the connections and assistance they need to expand access to afterschool and summer learning programs.

According to Secretary Miguel Cardona, "Quality out-of-school time programs have always supported students' academic, social, and emotional growth, but as we recover from the pandemic, these opportunities have never mattered more. We need bold action, especially for low-income students and students of color who have historically struggled to access quality afterschool programs and rich summer learning experiences. This new partnership cements the Department of Education's commitment to ensuring that more students have access to meaningful, enriching out-of-school programming, not just some of the day, but all day, all year round."

The Initiative will encourage and support schools, districts, local elected officials, local government agencies, community-based organizations, states, and others connected to out-of-school time efforts to take up ED's call to action on universal access and to encourage the utilization of American Rescue Plan resources in addition to other federal, state, and local resources to support access to out-of-school time as an evidence-based strategy to support student recovery from lost instructional time during the pandemic.

Through the American Rescue Plan, school districts, cities, and states have funding and an unprecedented opportunity to partner with high-quality expanded learning programs to support students' well-being and academic growth.




