



### In Memory of Rysheema Dixon 1987 - 2022

All of us at United Way of Delaware (UWDE) were shocked and deeply saddened to learn of the untimely passing of Rysheema Dixon, 35, a long-time friend and supporter of UWDE.

Rysheema was a dynamic, caring, passionate leader whose commitment to this community shone in ways big and small.

During the formative stages of the Wilmington HOPE Commission, she helped develop many of the processes and systems that are still today helping formerly incarcerated citizens return to productive lives.

The youngest woman ever elected to the Wilmington City Council, Rysheema led the first study of disparities in the city's procurement system. She later sponsored legislation updating the sex education curriculum in schools statewide. In her business life, Rysheema was the CEO & Founder of RD Innovative Solutions, a successful management consulting company that recently celebrated 11 years in business. And if all that wasn't enough, earlier this year she launched the Global Social Entrepreneurship program in Monrovia, Liberia, sharing her passion for social entrepreneurship with the people of that African nation.

I recall being invited recently by Rysheema to speak with a group of women who had completed a training program leading to a career in the trades. Programs like that are "so Rysheema." She never settled for the status quo. She was a fighter and an advocate for the underserved. But more than that, Rysheema Dixon knew how to get things done. An entrepreneur at heart, she used her business skills to break down barriers and to connect people around a shared purpose. I will miss her authenticity, her smile, her good heart and her

commitment to bettering the lives of those who are too often overlooked or left behind.

Rysheema Dixon's flame will burn brightly in our memories. On behalf of the entire UWDE team, I extend heartfelt condolences to Rysheema's family and to her many friends and colleagues throughout this community.

Rysheema and I didn't talk every day, we didn't text every day, and we didn't hang out every day. But when we did connect, it was meaningful.

## UWDE PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT: Stand By Me NexGen

#### **Creating Roadmaps to Dreams**

Preparing a child for college, junior college or trade school is complex and can be confusing. Youth who aren't exposed to stages of life planning in school often end up with no plan at all.

#### No plan + no goals = uncertain future.

That's why United Way of Delaware (UWDE) offers targeted resources for students, parents, teachers and guidance counselors called *Stand By Me NexGen*, a series of programs that begin with high school freshmen and extend through all four years of high school.



College, Careers and Cash: Explore and Envision

College, Careers, and Cash (CCC) comprises two interconnected curricula for ninth-and tenth-grade students.

- CCC: Explore helps ninth-grade students identify a lifestyle they feel would be rewarding for them. They develop a personal mission statement, identify career fields that align with their interests and strengths, and investigate the connections between work, income, and lifestyle.
- CCC: Envision guides tenth graders to further explore the lifestyle they want, starting with a dose of reality by putting a dollar figure to their dreams. Then, they identify careers that align with their lifestyle goals, and answer questions such as: What are the educational requirements of my ideal profession? Is this a growth field with lots of future opportunity? What are the entry-level and average pay scales for this career? Then, we put it all together in the form of a budget to see if they can afford the lives they envision.

#### **College Funding Project**

Eleventh- and twelfth-grade students are introduced to the *College Funding Project* (CFP) to help them understand that they *can* afford post-secondary education, and how to go about getting financial aid.

According to the National College Attainment Network (NCAN), some \$8 million in financial aid went unclaimed in Delaware last year, largely due to families not completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The application form can be daunting to students and parents alike. However, a completed FAFSA is required for all State of Delaware scholarship programs, institutional grants, athletic scholarships, and even the Federal Work/Study Program. At our current 66.7% FAFSA completion rate, Delaware ranks fifth in the nation for completion percentage. Yet, we need to do even better to make sure our students get the financial help they need.

The College Funding Project offers a menu of free services to help, students, families, and school staff understand and overcome the hurdles of financial aid through:

- Paying for College, a discussion of financial aid, FASFA and helpful resources
- Scholarships 102, explaining scholarships and offering tips on essay writing
- Workshops and one-on-one online appointments to complete the FASFA

With Stand By Me NexGen, students take an active role in planning their futures and understanding how to get there. It's a reality-based process and a source of hope that helps them develop a personal investment in developing and achieving life goals.

UWDE provides these programs without charge. The College Funding program is offered in all of the state's 44 public/charter high schools.

On the other hand, College, Careers and Cash is offered in about half of high schools because of financial constraints. 

A mother called us because she just accepted a new job. She was trying to work out how she was going to be successful in it while making sure her children were cared for. She was looking for an educational program for her older child and a childcare placement for her younger child. She needed help paying for the services, and a supply of diapers so she could send the little one for care.

We were able to help her connect with AccessCare for program referrals for her fouryear-old. We connected her with community programs that help with diapers and explained the state Purchase of Care program. She left the call with a plan, encouraged that there was help available.

When we followed up, she happily reported that she had been able to meet all her family's needs with the resources shared through Delaware 211 and Help Me Grow. It's a good feeling to know that you've helped someone transition into a more stable future for themselves and their family.


